Poor quality of care is at the root of maternal and neonatal mortality in Kenya

Over **80%** of recorded facility-based maternal deaths *could have been prevented through better quality care at the right time.*



33% of maternal deaths are caused by delays in seeking care



55% of maternal deaths are caused by delays in action or inadequate care by providers



Our innovative solutions are addressing critical challenges on both the demand and supply sides of timely, quality care

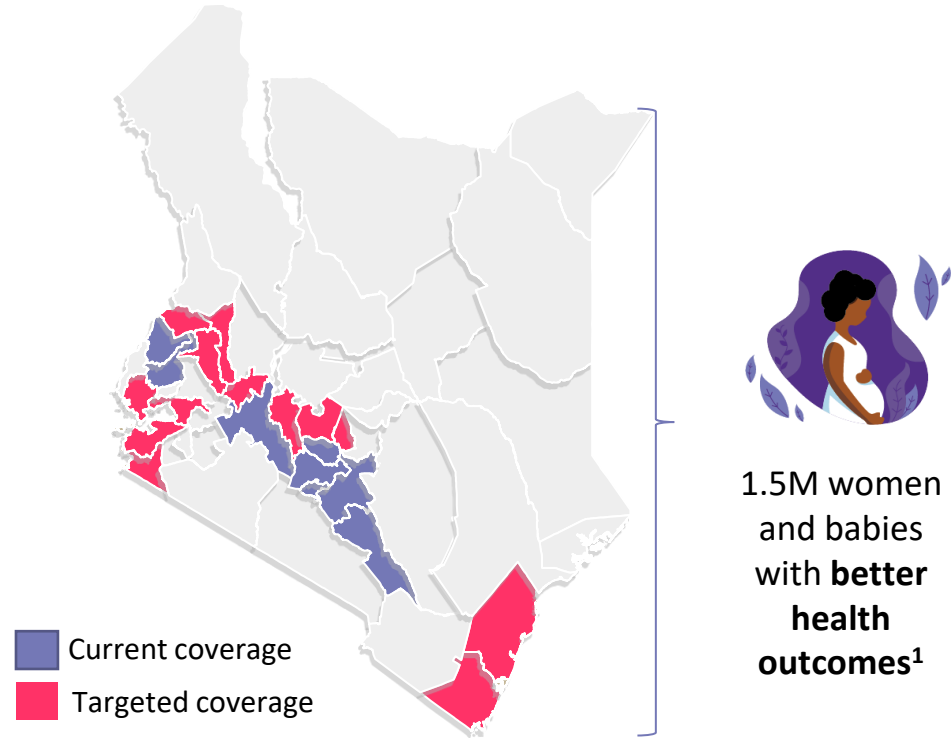
PROMPTS: digital health messaging platform that empowers women with information and improves health-seeking behavior at critical moments

MENTORS: Intensive, on-site EmONC mentorship program
Improves and sustains in life-saving emergency obstetric and newborn care (EmONC) skills

We will deploy our package solution and improve quality of care for over 1.5M mothers and babies

By 2023 working with 60% of the births in Kenya

We will also expand our programs to 1-2 new countries in the next year.



¹Estimated coverage for PROMPTS is 1,190,000 women by 2022; Mentors 100-200K annual births by 2022 (1,500,000 cumulative, 2020-2022)

Our approach: EmONC Mentorship takes the classroom to public facilities

In-Facility Mentors, who are government-salaried nurses, build the capacity of their peer nurses at public hospitals through the provision of:

- Government accredited curriculum which is delivered at the facility using **continuing medical education modules (CMEs)** and **simulation-based emergency drills**
- Data-driven approach to bedside coaching for **context-specific skill improvement**



Impact: improved and sustained quality of care



190 in-facility mentors have mentored **3,050+ providers** conducting **100,000 deliveries**

90% Of the essential steps performed during every delivery by mentored providers

50% Increase in neonatal resuscitation skills

80% Partograph initiation

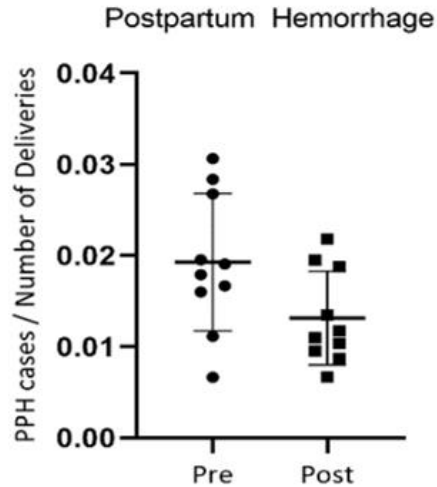
20% Decrease in rate of PPH at facilities

Preliminary impact results show a reduction in postpartum hemorrhage and neonatal deaths

Impact results from a recent assessment in Bungoma County, Kenya:

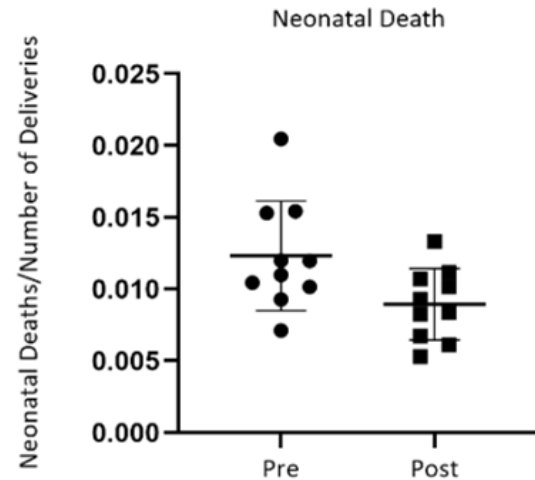
A 31% pre-post reduction reported rates of postpartum hemorrhage at partner public facilities.

This is ~20% *greater reduction* compared to non-mentor facilities



A ~27% reduction in reported rates of neonatal deaths at partner public facilities.

This is a 10% *greater reduction* compared to non-mentor facilities.

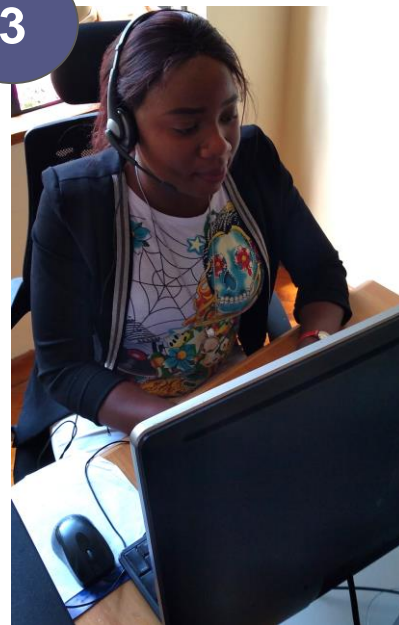

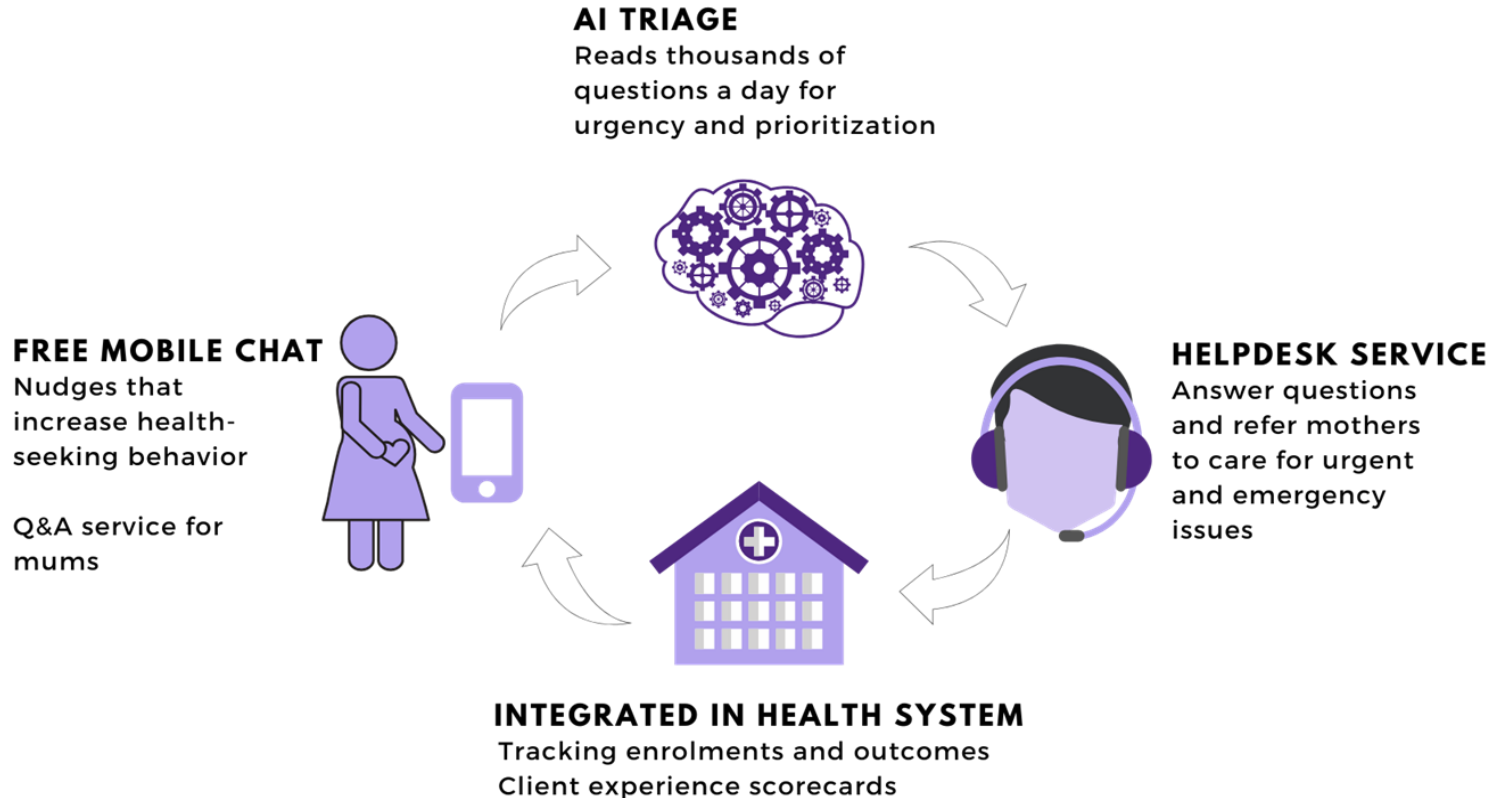

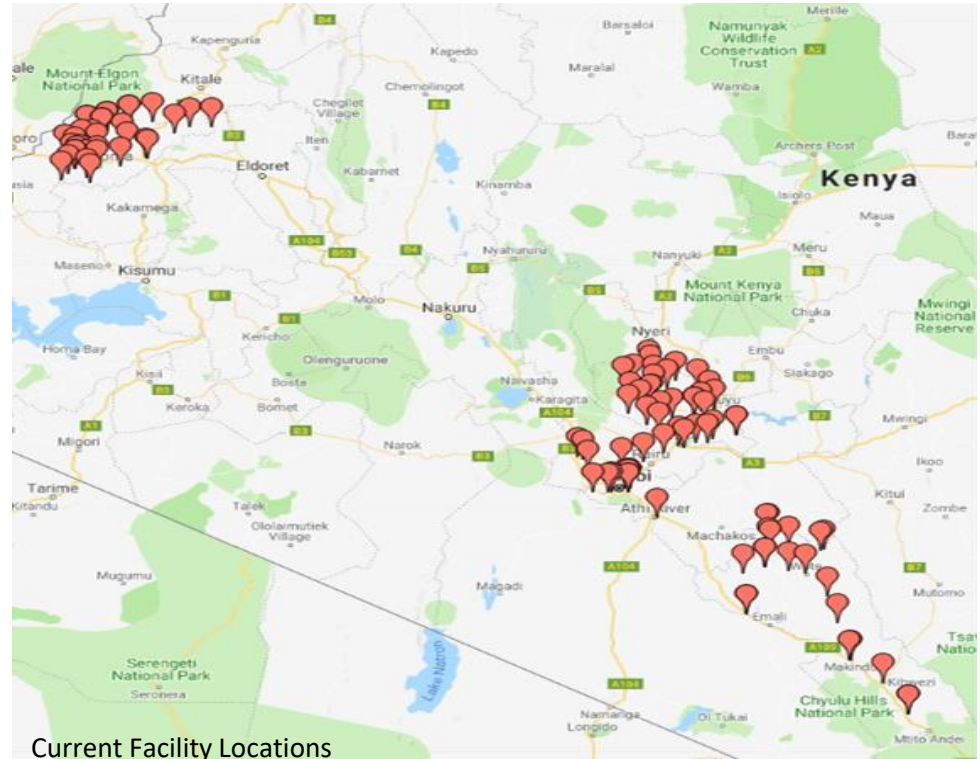

Scaling across Kenya so every pregnant woman and new mother has access to PROMPTS

- ~350,000 mothers enrolled in 10 counties
- 435+ partner facilities
- 30,000 new mothers added every month
- 1,500+ questions answered every day



Impact: ensuring mothers are connected to care



“I have learnt a lot about danger signs. I asked questions even when I was in labour and I got responses. I gave birth safely.... If you stop this service, many mothers would die”

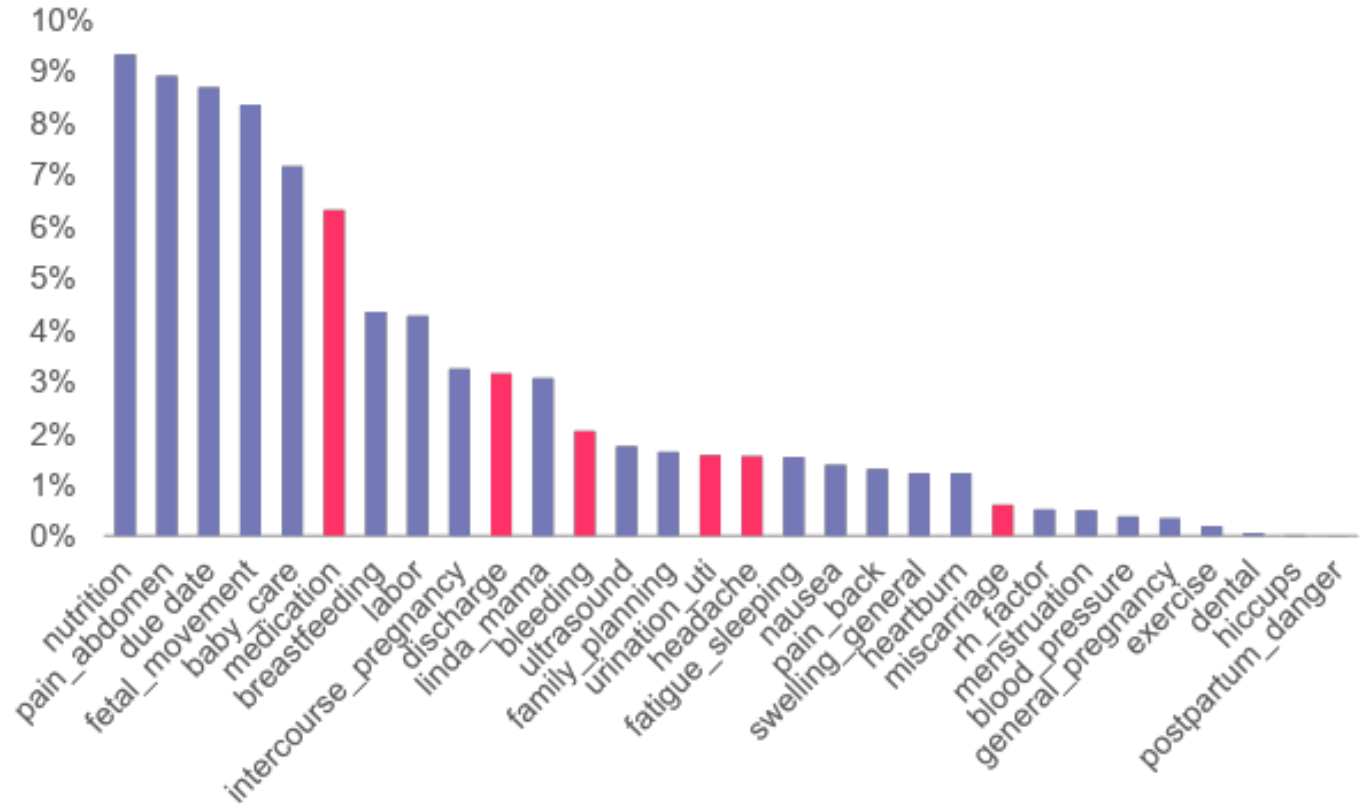

Finding the **red flags** in a haystack of questions

We get 1500+ questions every day

70% of the questions asked are general pregnancy, but **30% could be medically serious**

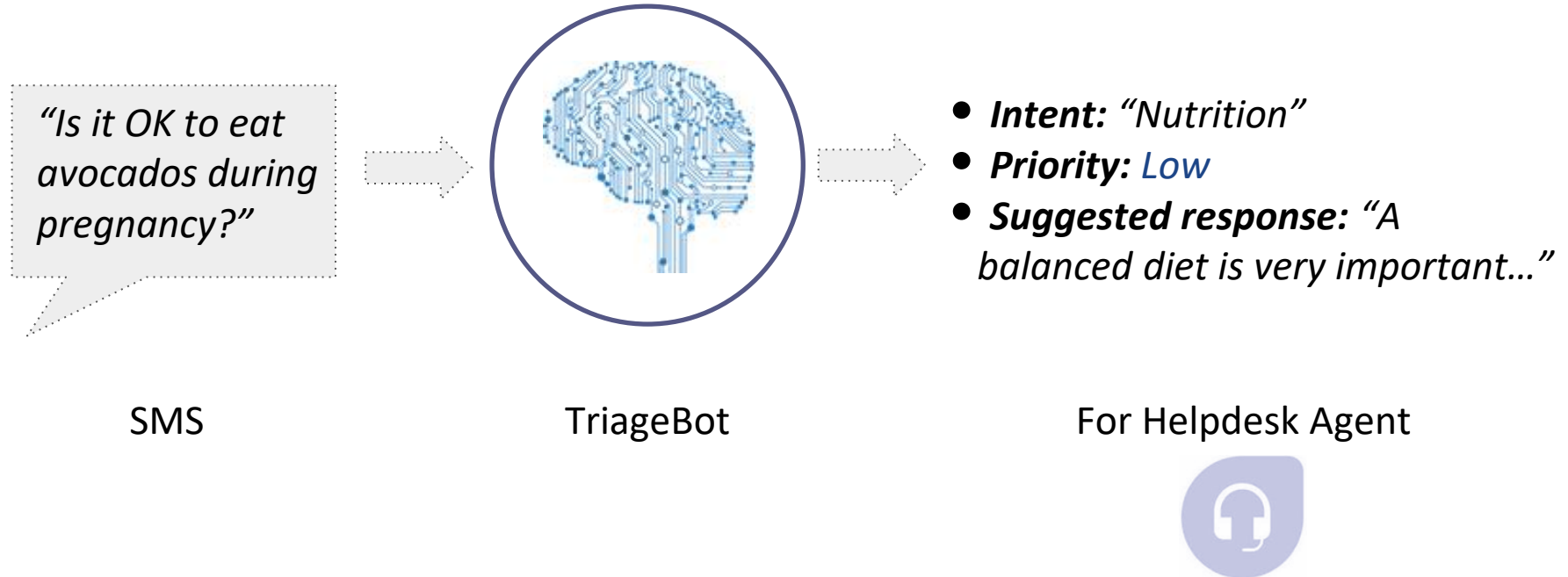

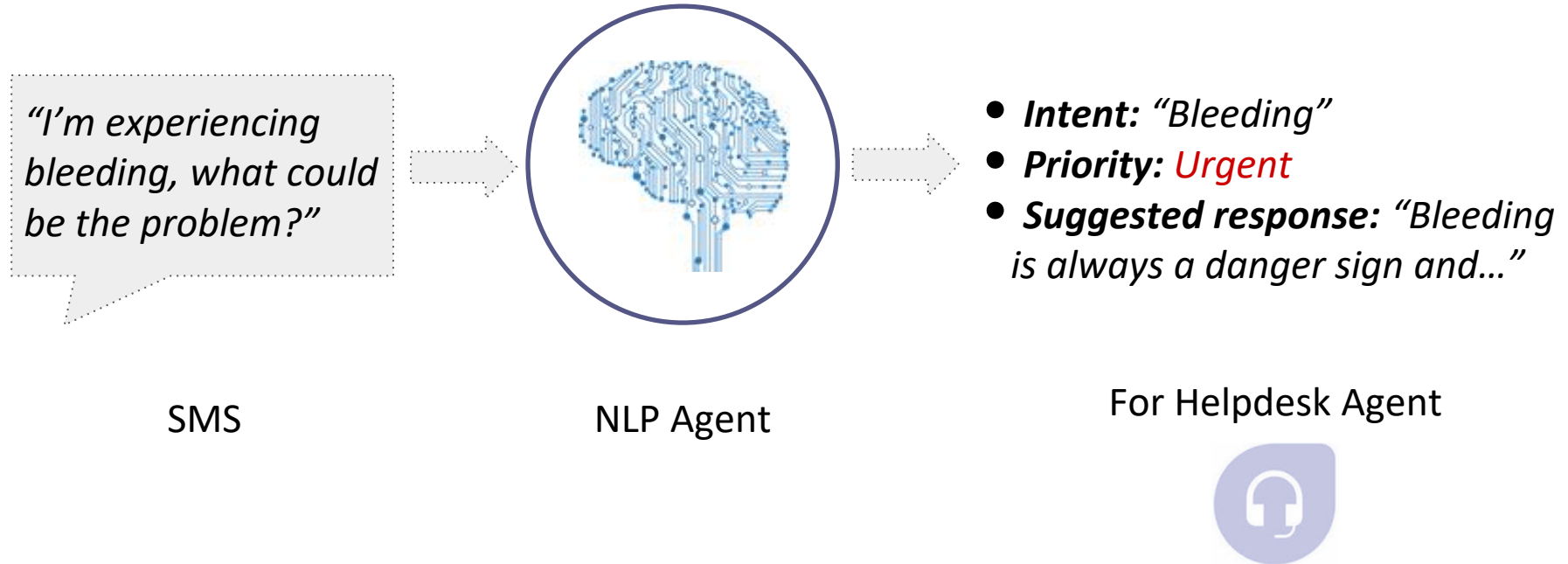

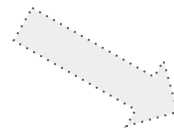
Automated Response: Version 2

Detected Intent:

- “Discharge”



Reasons to contact your healthcare provider are if the discharge is excessive, foul-smelling, or associated with other symptoms such as vaginal itching or pain. Brown or bloody discharge is always a concern and you should contact your provider.



Detected Intent:

- “Headache”



A persistent headache may be a pregnancy danger sign. Headaches are quite common in pregnancy and can be caused by stress, poor sleep, allergies, hunger, dehydration or more serious conditions.

Methods you can try to alleviate this pain are

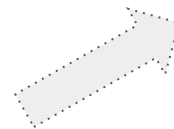


Detected Intent:

- “Swelling”



Swelling of the feet/ankles and hands is quite common in pregnancy and in fact about 50% of women who are pregnant will experience this, usually towards the end of their pregnancy. Leg swelling is also very common after delivery but should disappear by 2 weeks after the baby is born. Some methods you can try to alleviate this are by limiting



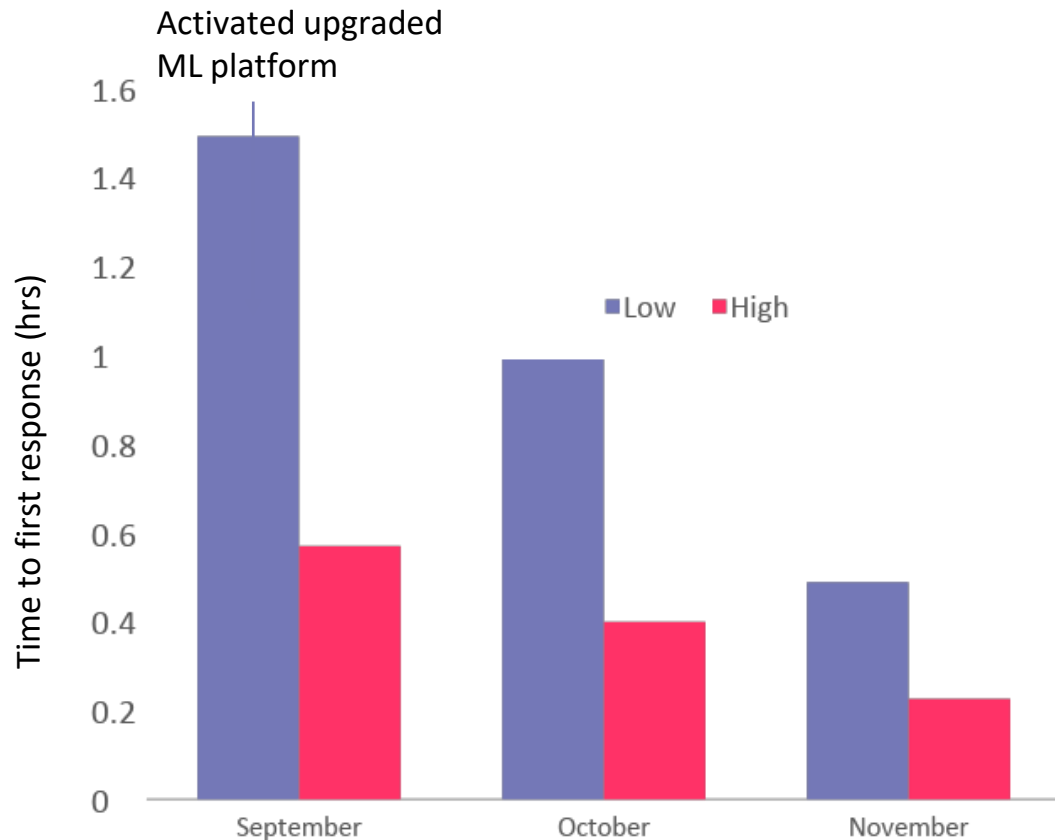

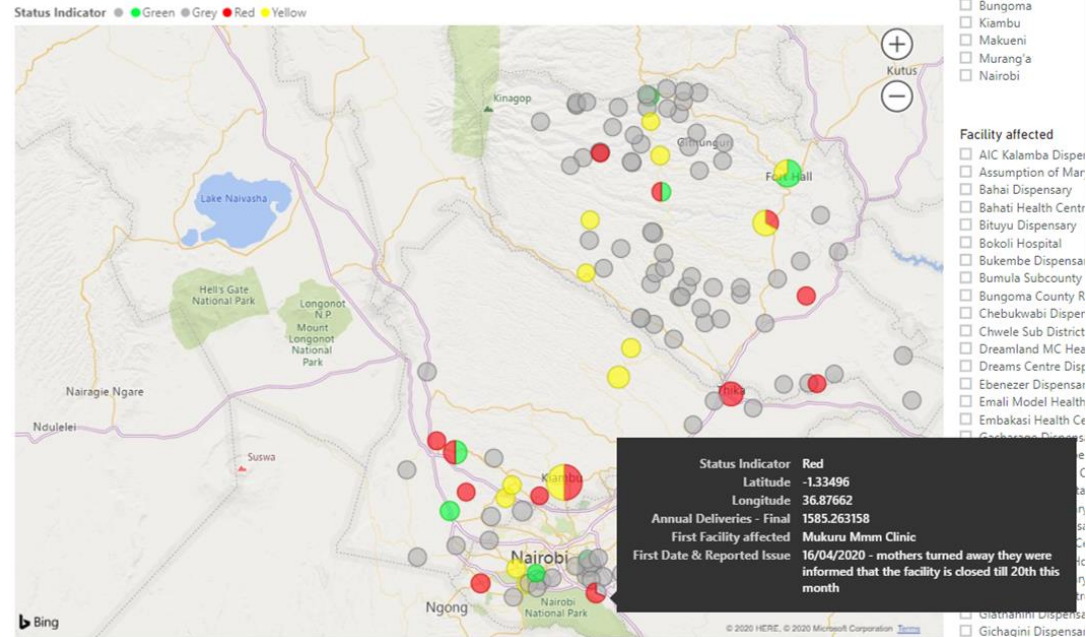

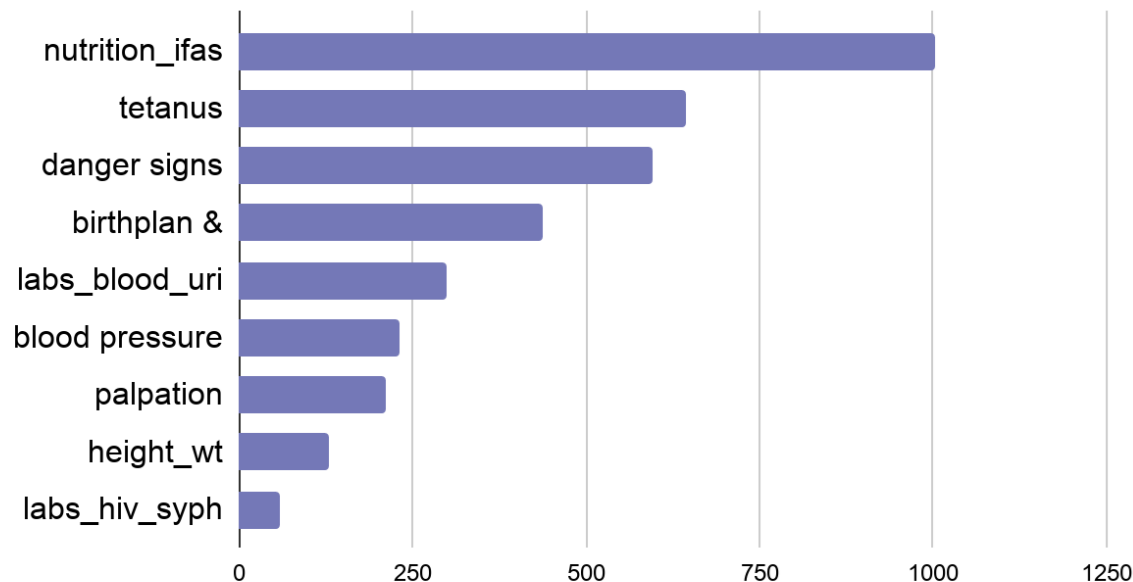


Measuring quality of care through PROMPTS:

Did a woman receive essential steps during an ANC appointment?

- After every appointment, PROMPTS 'checks in' with pregnant women to understand whether they had essential steps performed during an ANC visit
- Since June 2020, ~8300 mothers have provided feedback on their appointments
- 64% of pregnant women missed at least 1 step during ANC visit 1 (anc_2: 54%, anc_3: 28%, anc_4: 23%)

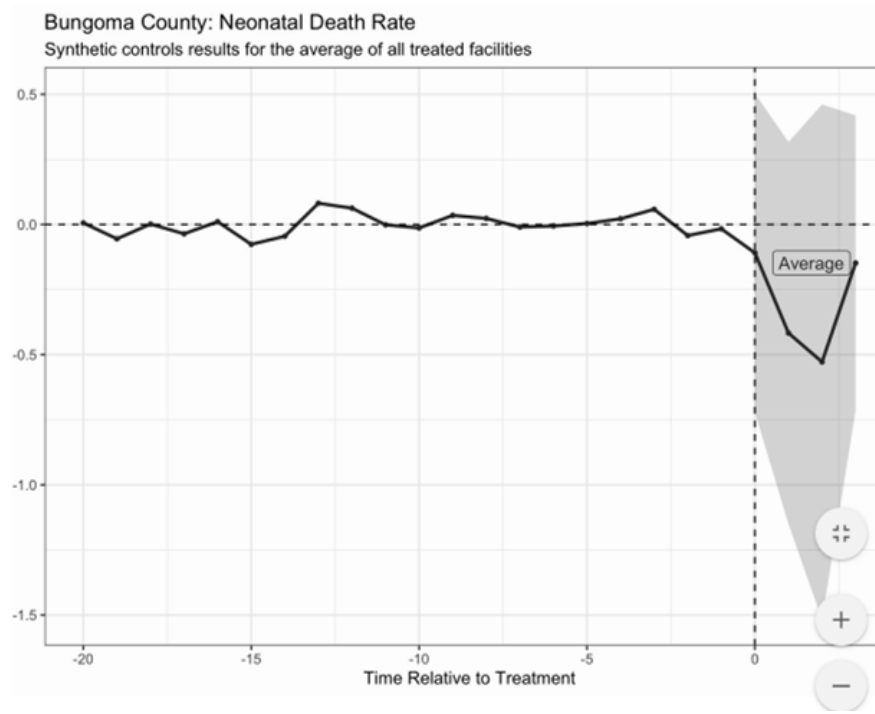
